IN PERU

The end of the holidays - the start of a new school year!

As you could read in February's newsletter the new school year starts in March. This means that 10 of our oldest toddlers go to primary school and cannot attend the project daily anymore. But this also means that we are able to welcome 10 other kids: Rodrigo (brother of Jhoncito and Alberto), Karen (sister of Jose Abel), Cesia, Brith, Ruth Belinda, Belen, Alizee, Sarahi, Neri and Laura.

Unfortunately we also had to say goodbye to Liset, because her family moved to Abancay, a city one and a half hours

away. Additionally, Elisban (Romina's brother) and his sister go to a school where classes last until the afternoon, so he is not able to make it every day. Off course we will follow these kids, and in a village as small as Curahuasi, we will often bump into each other.

AND LAST BUT NOT LEAST: Reyson, a boy with autism and a speech disorder - everyone's favorite - will go to a normal primary school. Together with his sister Zharit he will start in the first year. Off course we didn't just let him go, and agreed with the school to mentor him twice a week as a form of integrated education. We'll keep you informed!!





20/03/2017 New school year.. so back to the mountain schools Puka Puka and Ccochua

Since March we continue to go to the little mountain schools of Puka Puka and Ccochua. The toddlers are very enthusiastic when we arrive and participate well. In Puka Puka the big children join for 2 of the 5 classes: Sports and Sherborne (additional exercise to increase body awareness). Both teachers are the same as last year, which is uncommon, and has made working together easier. Both are also very interested to learn more about education. From now on we started making documents with more explanation to accompany the classes we give. We will also assist their classes so we can also learn from them; a nice opportunity for both.



18/03/2017 Monthly visit to the orphanage

Waking up early on a Saturday is always hard, but when you know it is to spend the morning with the children of the orphanage you just jump out of bed! The day started with a really nice ride to the beautiful town of Cachora. First we played some games we prepared, but after some games the children insisted on playing their favorite game 'Captain, can I cross?' a famous Belgian but also Peruvian game. The children enjoyed walking as a zombie or other crazy figures to avoid getting tagged. We finished our visit with a piece of cake and then returned to Oye LENA. It was quiet in the car, everybody was sad about leaving behind those grateful and enthusiastic children.

21/03/2017 World Down Syndrome Day

The 21st of March is World Down Syndrome Day and for this occasion student Charline organized a workshop for the volunteers. In the evening all the volunteers came together and learned a bit more about the disability of our students Maria and Jose Abel. They learned to understand them better and how to support them the best. Another interesting evening!

What is Down Syndrome?

Down syndrome arises from the fact that the person has an extra chromosome. A person normally has 23 pairs of chromosomes. But a person with Down syndrome is born with a third chromosome in the twenty-first pair.

The result of this extra chromosome is a mental disability. There are also a couple of physical features, who are linked to the syndrome of Down. Some of these features are a rounder face, eyes who stand a bit askew, they have a skinfold at the inside of their eyelids, a smaller throat, a thick tongue in comparison with their small mouth, and low standing ears and a lower nose bridge.

People with Down syndrome have a higher risk for health issues. Some examples are Alzheimer at a younger age, epilepsy, diabetes type 1, leukemia and problems with their intestines like their heart or thyroid. People with Down are to not live far a long time. (a small fact: a couple of weeks ago I saw that the oldest person with Down, just had his 77th birthday).

The way in which a person with Down syndrome develops, depends on the person itself. Every one of them is unique and goes through a different development. For example: it is possible that one person with Down has an IQ of 100, but another only reaches 45.

Godparents can let us know if they prefer to sponsor a boy or a girl, aged 3 or 4. When you become a godparent, you receive a picture via email.

Most of the communication will happen via email in order to keep costs down. Two times a year you will receive regular mail.

If you do not want to send your godchild messages via mail or email, that is no problem at all. If yes, you can do so in English. We will make sure a translation is available. However, keep in mind that our children are still very young. A nice picture will do more than a long letter. Also, do not forget that it can take a while before your letters arrive in Peru. If you want to avoid long waiting times, it is also possible to send an email. We will make sure your email gets printed and given to the child. You can send your email to oyelena.peru@gmail.com.

In order to make sure payments go as smoothly as possible, it is best to use a standing order. That way, you automatically deposit a fixed amount into our bank account (a minimum of $\le 10 = \le 0.30$ a day). Oye LENA has a Belgian bank account: BE28 06889753 0620 BIC: GKCCBEBB

The money is not destined to your individual godchild, but will be used for EVERY child on the project, for:

- buying food and drinks. The children receive a free lunch, fruit, a snack and drinks every day;
- financing visits to the doctor's, where the children receive free treatment and medication;
- buying toys and educational materials;
- celebrating birthdays and other festivities: cake and presents!

If you wish to stop being a godparent, you can do so anytime. You only have to send us an email and cancel your standing order.

We will also keep you up to date with all the latest developments of the project and your godchild!

DID YOU KNOW...

You can receive a tax certificate for your donations from € 40 and more?!

This certificate can be added to your tax declaration and the amount of your donation will be deducted from your taxable income.

To determine if you have the right to a tax certificate for a certain assessment year, all the donations you did during that year are being count up at the beginning of the next assessment year. If you reach a total sum of € 40 or more, you receive a tax certificate (at the beginning of the year following to the year you made the donation in).
